Dear Parents, Carers, and Students,

Wow 10 weeks goes fast and we are already into the second half of the year and the last stretch for year 12 students on the lead up to the HSC.

Lots of great things have been happening around the school and an even bigger term is on the horizon.

You may have noticed that a new system is being used for excursions and payments. The school has introduced School Bytes which is a management system endorsed by the Department of Education which should make the payment of excursions and fees a lot easier for parents and carers. As new facilities roll out from School Bytes, MSHS will be investigating their effectiveness and looking at how it can be used for the school community. Stay tuned for more updates.

Reports have been written and are going through their final checks ready for Parent teacher night on Thursday the 20th July in the hall. For year 7 students and parents, this will be the first report cycle for high school and we recommend that parents in years 7 through to 11 book times with their child's teachers to discuss their progress. We recommend that students accompany their parents/carers to the interviews so that they can hear what the teachers have to say firsthand and use the information effectively. Information about interview bookings should be out in the next few days. Looking forward to seeing you all there.

Subject selection night for both year 8 into 9 and year 10 into 11 2024 will take pace this term and it is essential that students and their parents/carers attend the information session and in the case of year 10 the learning conference that will follow where final subjects will be chosen in consultation with parents, students and staff to ensure that students are undertaking the best course of study for the senior years. Vital information will be discussed during the presentations and subject selection booklets will be available for all students.

Year 7 are half way through their first year of high school and things seem to be settling down for all students after such a big change from primary school.

Year 11 have started the first of three workshops for the mandatory Life Ready course. This course is a mandatory 25-hour course designed to prepare and support senior students as they encounter situations related to health and safety – as they become more independent and gain more responsibilities. The first session ran in the last week of term 2, the second session will run during camp and the third session will be held offsite. Students who miss any of the sessions will need to complete and hand in the course booklets so that they can be signed off with the Department of Education as having completed the units.



The Year 11 camp is running from the 19th to the 21st of July at the Great Aussie Bush camp in Kincumber. Students will undertake the second unit of the Life Ready course while away on camp and complete some physical challenges while consolidating some valuable friendships amongst the group. Students who are not attending camp are still expected to attend school where the Life Ready session will be presented and an alternative timetable for the three days will happen.

bstreetsmart at Sydney Olympic Park on August 22nd is the final unit in the Life Ready course which covers road safety education. It is an initiative of the Trauma Service at Westmead Hospital that has a strong commitment to Road Safety Education. bstreetsmart provides students with firsthand experiences and:

- An understanding of their responsibilities as a driver and as a responsible passenger
- Information and strategies to avoid serious injuries and death
- Information on how to reduce risk taking behaviour through greater awareness of the consequences of distracted driving, inattention, speeding, drink and drug driving and driver fatigue.

The purpose of bstreetsmart is to reduce the fatality and injury rates of young people by promoting safe behaviour as drivers, riders and passengers. All year 11 students will be expected to attend this event.

School is coming to a close for Year 12 with only one term left until the final HSC exams. Before that however there are a few important events happening for Year 12. Trial exams are in weeks 3 and 4 and students are expected to sit for all scheduled exams as they are part of their school based assessment – ATAR or non ATAR students. Year 12 students do not have to attend school during the examination weeks on days when they do not have a scheduled exam unless they are sitting for a rescheduled exam which has been missed due to illness or misadventure. Any student who misses a trial exam due to illness MUST advise the school on the morning of the exam and MUST have a medical certificate with specific details as to why the exam was missed. The student must then submit an illness and misadventure form with the medical certificate attached to the deputy and the exam will be rescheduled in the exam period. In the HSC the same procedure is followed however exams are not rescheduled.



The Year 12 graduation will take place on Wednesday the 20th of September in the school hall and parents and family will be invited to aknowledge the end of their students schooling. Information about the event will be sent out closer to the date. The Year 12 formal is on the same night at Doltone House at Jones Bay Wharf and students are looking forward to celebrating. Fundraising has already started to take place with a bake sale and a big thank you to students, parents and staff who contributed yummy cakes and slices.

Graduation will be the end of the school year for year 12 except for their attendance at the HSC exams and school sign out day which is in term 4. Year 12 students are not expected to attend school on the Thursday and Friday of the last week of school. Some fun activities for year 12 students are planned for the Monday and Tuesday of the last week of term as a lead up to graduation and more information will be available closer to the date.

Year 12 Update

As the countdown begins and the end of term draws near, Year 12 students have been busy pouring their efforts into finalising all assessments.

Throughout the term, students received their published HSC timetable and updated their details on Schools Online. This is an important step to ensure they receive their HSC results, and all communication is sent to the correct address. If students missed out, they are encouraged to see me as soon as possible. Additionally, students need to thoroughly read over the required equipment guidelines and times for all final examinations.

A group of Year 12 students attended a career expo, gaining valuable information for their future career pathways. It is important for students to take advantage of these opportunities to develop the tools to make informed decisions about their post-secondary education and professional aspirations.

And finally, we announced that the Year 12 Graduation will take place on September 20th, followed by the Year 12 Masquerade Formal. The formal will be a great night to celebrate students' achievements, enjoy a three-course meal, music entertainment, and bid farewell before HSC exams. Parents and carers are encouraged to attend the graduation, so be sure to place this date in your calendar! A formal invitation will be sent through next term.

A big shoutout to the school leadership team and volunteers who assisted in fundraising for the formal. Year 12 hosted a bake sale and raffle in which they raised \$600, which will be used for decorations, photobooth hire, and a DJ. It was great to see everyone band together for a good cause.







Faculty Update- English/HSIE

We have just concluded an action packed term in the English/HSIE faculty. 7M and 7A continued with Sydney Story Factory, focusing on characterisation this term. Their Monday morning sessions involved building interesting characters, using features such as clothing, voice and personality traits to reveal unique characters. These writing workshops directly supplemented Year 7's study of the Horror genre for which they had to produce a piece of creative writing as their assessment.

Our senior HSIE students have been busy this term preparing for major works. In Year 11 Aboriginal Studies, students completed a local community case study, choosing an Aboriginal controlled organisation within the La Perouse community. Students conducted interviews with representatives from each organisation, and used this information to put together projects in a format of their choice. Year 11 Geography students have commenced their Senior Geography Project, where they research an issue or problem associated with their area of interest, related to the biophysical or built environment. Year 12 Society and Culture have been putting the finishing touches on their Personal Interest Projects, where they have chosen, researched about and written a research report on a relevant issue relating to persons, society, culture, environment and time. Students have chosen issues such as the role of systemic racism in the over-representation of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples in the justice system, and the impact of Artificial Intelligence on the creative arts.

Stage 4 debating participants competed in two debates this term, against Randwick Girls High School and the Conservatorium High School. Topics included 'should teachers retire at 65?' and 'should violent music be banned?'. Cindy Barahona in Year 8 deserves special commendation for her excellent argument in the second debate.

To finish off the term, Year 7 participated in a year-wide Chinese calligraphy competition hosted by the wonderful Ms Wang. Students were treated to a live calligraphy demonstration by special guests from the Australian Society of Calligraphers. Students then wrote their names in Chinese calligraphy, with the finalists invited to decorate a fan with their designs. Congratulations to our finalists Sam Adams-Bennet and Boss Faasootaula (3rd), Ari Margaritis (2nd) and Lilly Gladwin Turnbull (1st).





Faculty Update- PDHPE

It has been another big term for the PDHPE Department. Students have been engaged in both their theory and practical lessons and have developed their movement skills across a number of sports such as Volleyball, Lacrosse, Cricket and Badminton.

The scaffolding has gone up around the outside of the gymnasium and as a result the PDHPE staff have relocated their staffroom to the main building in preparation for the renovation. So far there has been little disruption to normal procedures and we look forward with excitement to the upgrade of our facilities.

The Life Ready 25 hour Compulsory PDHPE Course began in Week 10, with students completing Day 1 (5 hours) on "Health and Safety". Day 2, "Owning Yourself" will be completed on the Year 11 Camp and for those not attending camp, will be held at school during normal class time. Please note these hours are mandatory and anyone missing these programs will need to complete assigned work to make up the hours missed. This will be followed up early Term 3.

There have been numerous competitions that we have participated in and our students have been very successful in their sporting pursuits (as showcased below).

The Zone Athletics Carnival is our next big event. It will be held on the first Friday of Week 1, Term 3 (21st July 2023). Students have been entered via School Bytes and the team was advertised on Compass on the 30th June. Students are encouraged to check if they are on the list. The venue is Hensley Athletics Field and the cost of entry is \$8 (to be paid on School Bytes). Students will make their own way to the venue and wear the MSHS Sport uniform to compete.

We have completed another successful term of Recreational Sport at Mutch Park. However, next term there will be some changes. Students will be walking over to Pioneers Park accompanied by teaching staff to the turf field and walking track. Options for Term 3 are Multi Sports, Powerwalking and Skateboarding. In Term 3 skateboarding students will travel to a variety of venues in the School Van (Mutch Park, Chifley SkatePark and Rockdale SkatePark). The cost for Skateboarding for the term is \$40. Parental permission is required for all of the sports mentioned and the sooner this is done, the sooner we can start the sports program.

Check-in Assessments

This term we have completed Check-in Assessments with all Year 8 students. They are mapped to the NSW Syllabuses and National Literacy and Numeracy Learning Progressions. Check-in assessments are an online assessment consisting of reading and numeracy. Each assessment consists of 40-50 multiple choice questions.

The assessment can supplement existing school practices to identify how students are performing in literacy and numeracy and to help teachers tailor their teaching more specifically to student needs.

I would like to congratulate our Year 8 students, as they have shown a commitment to their studies through their effort and behaviour during these assessments.

COVID Tutoring

A number of our students received support through the COVID tutoring program. This semester we focused on literacy, whilst next semester will see a focus on numeracy. Our students are identified through various assessments and results show that this model is successful in boosting the results of identified students. Well done to the students who have worked hard this semester, we look forward to increased numeracy results next semester.

Learning and Support



Inclusive Learning Centre (ILC)

Despite the onslaught of Winter, ILC has been a hub for physical fitness and mental wellbeing. Ms Furner and Ms Darben have been running Burn2Learn program which addresses the issue of physical activity decline of adolescents with disability between 15-19 years of age. Evidence based research conducted by The University of Newcastle confirms that students participating in Burn2Learn's program experience substantial improvements in physical health (e.g. cardiorespiratory fitness and muscle strength) and mental wellbeing (e.g. self-concept, self-efficacy, and social outcomes).

By incorporating physical activity during the day students are more engaged and motivated to learn and are better able to retain information and apply it to real-world situations. It enables students to set goals and track performance. It incorporates the high intensity interval training principles to maximise the greatest benefit from exercise in the shortest amount of time and develop student enjoyment from exercise.

The Yamaha incursion was attended by two of our students with great success. They participated in this valuable work-readiness event explored how to generate an effective resume and how to present self for future job interviews. Then, the event concluded with a re-assembly of a Yamaha motorbike, which required attention to details, communication skills, teamwork skills and resilience. Eve Loye pictured below demonstrated exceptional performance at all the components of the Yamaha event.

In respect work experience, it has been a dynamic term in ILC with many activities taking place. Senior students attended Windgap Foundation, Disability Services Australia and Avenue. Students developed skills in travel training and participated in work activities. Nova employment presented a series of sessions on skills need post school. Two year 12 students Cody Marshall and Liam Burns are travelling independently to TAFE to complete the Retail course; a wonderful opportunity for them. Year 10 students have been completing a school past TAFE course run by Job Quest – Foundation skills for Post-school. Students had the opportunity to visit Enmore TAFE this term to see the excellent creative arts programs offered at this campus.
